Preparing for Lent: A Journey to the Foot of the Cross: Part 1

In about ten days, we will embark on our 40-day journey to the foot of the Cross, culminating in the celebration of Christ's salvific work through His suffering, death, and resurrection. But how can we truly prepare to observe Lent? Why is this season so vital for our spiritual lives?

Lent is an extended act of prayer and penance, inviting us into a deeper relationship with Christ. It is a journey of spiritual discipline, leading us to conversion and renewal, and a time of giving things up as an opportunity to realign our hearts with God. The Church offers us the three pillars of Lent:—prayer, fasting, and almsgiving—three essential practices that help us grow in holiness.

The Call to Self-Denial

During Lent, we are invited to surrender attachments that distract us from God, whether they be material comforts, unhealthy habits, or even attitudes that keep us from living out fully the faith. What do we turn to for comfort instead of Christ? What consumes our time and energy more than prayer? As we lay down these "idols." we make room for God's grace to work in us.

Fasting: A Spiritual Fruit of Self-Denial

Jesus does not say "if you fast" but "when you fast" (cf. Matt 6:16), emphasizing that fasting is an expected part of the Christian life. Fasting is more than self-discipline. It is a tangible way of crucifying the desires of the flesh so that we may live more fully in the Spirit.

Fasting helps us:

- Recognize that spiritual nourishment is more vital than physical sustenance.
- Learn self-mastery, gaining control over our desires rather than being enslaved by them.
- Express sorrow for sin and a willingness to change.
- Stand in Solidarity with those who suffer hunger, poverty, and hardship.
- Humbly acknowledge our dependence on God and surrender to His will.

Fasting, however, should not be seen in isolation—it is an act of penance that must be accompanied by prayer and charity.



We are well aware of the conflict between Israel and Palestinians in the Middle East. They hate each other. This weekend the gospel teaches us to love our enemy. The stories below tell us there are human hearts who love the enemy even in their difficult time and stand as a witness for gospel values.

Both stories are from one of the earlier conflicts between Israel and Palestinian militants:

CNN TV news reporter Peter Arnett was visiting the West Bank in Israel when a bomb exploded in the middle of town. He was surrounded by anguished, screams and clouds of smoke. A man holding an! injured girl ran up to Peter and asked for a ride to a ! hospital. As they sped through the streets, the man I nursed the bloody girl in the backseat. The doctors did! everything to save the girl's life, but to no avail. Peter turned to comfort the man on the loss of his child, but the man interrupted him. She wasn't his child, he said. She was a Palestinian. He was Israeli. He found her I lying in the street and decided to help. "Mister," he said through his tears, "there must come a time when i we realize that we are all family." Do you wish your family would be more appreciative, take the initiative in work or play, demonstrate a more positive attitude, or be more transparent about feelings? Whatever you wish that others would do to you, do also to them.

What would it look like with your friends?

Do you wish they would call to check on you, bring you coffee, initiate meet ups, answer texts more promptly, or offer practical help to you when you're overwhelmed? Whatever you wish that others would do to you, do also to them.

On February 4 in the year 2007, i I the ABC re-broadcast a program i documenting the moving story of i ' Marsha Gladstone, a Jewish woman 🕻 I from Scotland. When a bus in Tel; Aviv was shattered in a suicide; bombing, Marsha's 19-year-old son; I Yoni Jesner was critically injured.; Yoni never regained consciousness, ; i and before he died, the family; agreed to make some of his organs: available for transplant. The decision to donate helped them to find some meaning in this senseless tragedy. The subsequent revelation that one of Yoni's kidneys had saved the life of: Yasmin Rumeilah, a seven-year-old : Palestinian girl, came as quite a ! shock to the family. It had simply ! never occurred to this Jewish family! that a child of the "enemy' would! become the beneficiary of Yoni's gift. !

A year after Yoni's death and at! considerable personal cost, Marsha! visited Yasmin and her family in their! home in the West Bank. The Jewish 1 mother who had lost her son I embraced the Palestinian mother I whose child lives with gratitude in I her heart for the young Jewish man I who gave her another chance at life ! and whom she now refers to as her "brother." There was extraordinary moment of womb- I compassion in the embrace of these I two women, one Jewish and the i ! other Muslim. The hatred and ι misunderstanding of the generations i seemed to dissolve in their i ' encounter.
