The Liturgical Calendar: Ordinary Time is Extraordinary Time (Continued)

The Cycle of Readings

The liturgical year is described in the lectionary which is a cycle of readings. The lectionary is so extensive that over a three-year cycle nearly the entire New Testament and the most significant portions of the Old Testament are covered.

Cycle A – Matthew Cycle B – Mark Cycle C – Luke The Gospel of John is used in all three, especially during Cycle A in Lent.

We are currently in Cycle C.

Ordinary Time

Ordinary Time begins on Monday after the Sunday following January 6th, and continues until Tuesday before Ash Wednesday. It begins again on the Monday after Pentecost and ends before evening prayer of the First Sunday of Advent. In

Ordinary Time, we learn the teachings of Christ and work to build up the Kingdom of God!

This time is called "ordinary" not because it is not special or less significant but simply because the weeks of Ordinary Time are numbered. The Latin word ordinalis, which refers to numbers in a series, stems from the Latin word ordo, from which we get the English word order. Thus, the numbered weeks of Ordinary Time, in fact, represent the ordered life of the Church—the period in which we live our lives neither in feasting (as in the Christmas and Easter seasons) or in more severe penance (as in Advent and Lent).

The goal of Ordinary Time is to order our life to Christ's. For a disciple, ordinary time is extraordinary time.

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

WELCOME BACK TO ORDINARY TIME

When we walk into the church after the feast of Epiphany of the Lord, anyone would be surprised that all the decorations are gone; wreaths, nativity scene with wise men from the east and star, the Christmas trees with illumination in the sanctuary and vestibule, and the red bunting from the rafters are not there. It means to say that we have entered into the Ordinary Seasons of the liturgical year. Welcome back to Ordinary Time!

The liturgical season begins with Advent and ends with the feast of Christ the King. With the Baptism of the Lord at the last Sunday we enter into the Ordinary Seasons.

The liturgical year is made up of six seasons:

Advent - four weeks of preparation in three ways: first, meditating on the promises of the messiah to be born; second, preparing spiritually to celebrate the historical birth of Jesus; third, awaiting for the second coming of Christ at the end of the world.

Christmas - recalling the Nativity of Jesus Christ and his manifestation to the peoples of the world; this will last till the Epiphany of the Lord.

Lent - a six-week period of penance before Easter; this is the time one repents for sins and looks for God's mercy and forgiveness which will bring us to Holy Week.

Sacred Paschal Triduum - the holiest "Three Days" of the Church's year, where we recall the suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus. This is the most Holy Days in the liturgical year. (Actually, the *church* attendance is not good on these three days).

Easter - 50 days of joyful celebration of the Lord's resurrection from the dead and his sending forth of the Holy Spirit.

Ordinary Time - divided into two sections (one span of 4-8 weeks after Christmas Time and another lasting about 5-6 months starting from Pentecost Sunday). Totally, this would last 34 weeks, starting with the Baptism of the Lord and ending with the feast of Christ the King.

Welcome back to Ordinary Time, the longest of the Church Seasons! This is our base line, our: normal. In this season, we cover most of the day: -to-day the story of Jesus' life - preaching, using: parables, doing "mighty works," – with the dayto-day struggles and successes.

Let us participate in the Liturgical Seasons of the year and become the ardent followers of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Characteristics of the Jubilee: Indulgences

Jubilee Indulgence is a concrete manifestation of God's mercy, which goes beyond and *transforms the boundaries of I human justice. This treasury of grace entered human history in I the witness of Jesus and the saints, and by living in communion with them our hope • for our own forgiveness is strengthened and becomes a certainty. The Jubilee indulgence allows us to free our hearts from the weight of sin because the reparation due for our sins is

given freely and abundantly.

In practical terms, the experience of God's mercy. involves some spiritual acts indicated by the Pope. Those who cannot make the Jubilee pilgrimage due to illness or other circumstances are nonetheless invited to take part in the spiritual movement that accompanies the Jubilee year, offering up the sufferings of their daily lives, and participating in the Eucharistic celebration.
