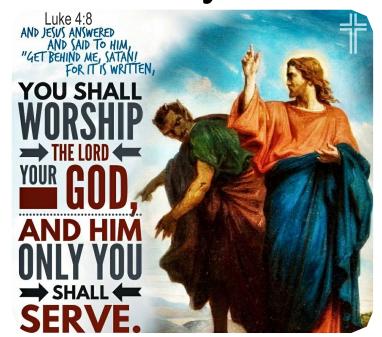

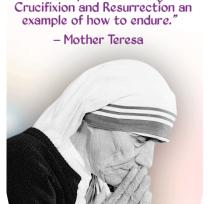

A Prayer for Lent

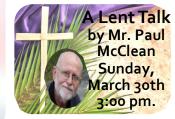
Please, Lord, guide my mind with your truth.

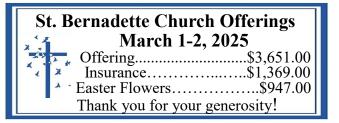

A JOYFUL RETURN

Our desire for pure and perpetual joy is one thing, and the actual reality is another. It seldom happens to us that any joy comes so pure as not to be tempered by sorrow. Besides, when pure joy does come, it is very brief, for life batters at its sails. For many of us, life itself is an embodiment of contradictions: love and hatred, strength and weakness, humiliation and glory, truth and I falsehood, direction and chaos, life and death. All I these are weighing so heavily on us.

Each of us, in some part of life, finds something upsetting that robs us of our joy. However, we believe that, God being the source of perfect joy, the more consistent we are in our closeness with God, the more permanent will be our joy. So Lent invites us to return to God and be reconciled with him in such a way that our relationship with him will remain intimate and lasting.

God appeals to us during this Lent through Joel: "Return to me with all your heart" (Joel 2:12). St Paul reminds us that Lent is the "acceptable time... the day of salvation" (2 Cor 6:2). The ashes we

used on Ash Wednesday remind us that if we have ! to rise to new life of pure joy, we have to I acknowledge that our relationship with God has I not been close enough, and hence the need to i return to him with a broken heart. The good deeds i such as prayer, fasting and almsgiving that our Lord; mentions in the Gospel (Mt 6:1-18) are meant to; make us pleasing to God; but they must be undertaken for the right reason. For example, what we save by fasting is to be offered to the hungry as almsgiving. These are Lenten opportunities.

Just as the spring brings a cheer to heart of those who look forward to a time of flowering and ! growth, so we are invited to approach the season ! of Lent with a hope of renewal and focus on the I opportunities for deepening our relationship with I God and thus set our feet firmly on the path to i fuller joy.

Let us take efforts to return joyfully to the Lord. In the Service of the Lord.

Lent is a time to rid ourselves of habits that are doing little good, or even causing harm, to ourselves and others, and to replace them with habits that are lifegiving. Unfortunately, old habits die hard. And contrary to the popular notion that habits can be changed in 21 days, experts tell us that it can take up to a making holiness a year to change old habits and develop new ones. Lent is 40 days for a reasonholiness is a habit, and habits take time habit during Lent Fasting:

to take hold. In his book The Power of Habit: Why We Do What We Do in Life and Business (Random House). Charles Duhigg explains that when we perform an action for the first time, the brain works very hard to collect all the pertinent information involved and stores the information in the part of the brain called the basal ganglia. If we continue to do the same action every day, the basal ganglia fills in the details so the rest of the brain can turn its attention to other things. Eventually, the action can be performed "without thinking." In short, our brains are looking for ways to save effort, and forming habits is the key to achieving this.

Lent is a time to interrupt this habit loop. We need to get our brains "thinking" and not just acting on automatic pilot. To do so, we focus on three actions — "keystone habits" — habits which are so key that when changed they cause a ripple or domino effect in other areas and other habits of our lives. These three keystone habits are, of course, prayer, fasting, and almsgiving.



Three keys to

One of the best ways to extinguish our old self is to take some time away from words. When our words cease, the ego is neutralized. At the same time, a space opens up into which God can speak instead. The essence of prayer is silence. It also creates a space into which a host of other good and selfless habits can flow.

When babies are hungry, they cry. That's how we are born: obsessed with our own needs. A consumer society perpetuates this infantile state. When we intentionally put the brakes on consuming—whether it be food, drink, sex, or material goods—we are introducing a new habit that challenges the old: We are shifting the focus away from ourselves and our own "needs" and enabling ourselves to be more attuned to the needs of others.

Almsgiving:

During Lent, we increase our generosity toward others, not to earn grace, please God, or draw attention to our own holiness, but to experience grace. Generosity enables us to rise above ourselves and to live, as St. Ignatius of Loyola said, as a person for others.

When these three keystone habits are practiced, a ripple effect of selflessness occurs: We no longer view ourselves as the center of the universe. And that is the beginning of the habit of holiness.

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
